



We want to hear your thoughts and concerns. The Council's current main discussion topic has been strategic planning for our parish, which is something that you will be hearing more about over the next several months.

Council members wear maroon-colored nametags at Mass and other church functions, so we are easily identifiable to others. If you have concerns or questions, please feel free to stop a council member at any time when we are wearing a nametag. You can also call the following council members with questions and concerns: Tom McMullen at 763-425-0227 or Marci Siers at 763-420-9460. Each parishioner's New members may join in the springquestion or concern will be given thoughtful consideration, and you will receive a response in a timely manner.

The Council meets at 7 PM every 3rd Tuesday of each month for 1 1/2 hours (excluding the months of December and July). The Council consists of nine parishioner-voting members and two non-voting members, which are our pastor and our business manager. Each member serves a term of three years and may serve up to a limit of two full terms.



A LOOK AT THE PAST

Harvest Festival 1963—A Visit From Father Boerboom

The Rev. Henry J. Boerboom, dependable as the turning of the seasons, loomed up at my desk. His voice boomed out a greeting, he pulled up the hard-seated wooden chair reserved for visitors and announced:

"You know why I'm here."

Since this is a yearly ritual, I knew the answer. After all, when a priest is - unbelievably for his zest and physique in his 80th year and takes to the road to promote a parish festival, you can't start explaining that other parishes have festivals, too. Who could say nay to the Netherlands-born, Minnesota-and-Belgium-reared pastor of St. Vincent de Paul parish in Osseo? How could I insist that we had to be able to defend his harvest festival against all comers - to prove it is unique?

"We're expecting to feed another 3,000 with chicken dinner next Sunday," he started off, after a big, firm handshake. "We'll serve from 11 in the morning until 6 at night, same as we have for 45 years. And we'll charge just \$1.50 for adults, 75 cents for children, and that includes homemade pies, too. And there will be all sorts of booths operating all day and into the evening. You know that the Osseo community is only 27 percent Catholic, but 49 merchants have donated some marvelous merchandise for could spot. our visitors Sunday."

Back of that, of course, is Father Boerboom's enthusiasm, his persuasiveness. During his 47 years in the parish, he

has built a school, a new rectory, and enlarged the old one for use as a convent. Last year, 79 boys and girls of the parish had half their tuition paid at Catholic high schools. This is plenty of use for any funds Sunday's festival dinner and all the rest will raise.

And what was the guarantee of good weather Sunday?

"We have never been rained out in 45 years," grinned Father Boerboom. "Of course, we were almost

blown out the Sunday the Anoka tornado hit in 1939. Flattened our stands in Osseo, forced us to move our dinner serving and whatever else we could salvage into the

church basement. But the edge of one tornado in 45 years doesn't take much of a bite out of our record for good weather, does it?"

With which Father Boerboom rose, gave me another pressurized handshake and was on his way to tell the story of next Sunday's harvest festival to every likely prospect he

- We will justify our pledge through service within and around our community. (cf. Matthew 25:34-36 "Come, vou who are blessed by my Father:...For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.")

May the good Lord bless you for supporting and being part of our social justice programs through this ongoing outreach campaign. -Okey Anyanwu,





Smartboards have begun to be used at SVDP and

will be installed in every classroom prior to the 2009-2010 school year. Smartboards are interactive whiteboards that engage students with hands-on learning.

Kathleen O'Hara of St. Vincent de Paul School, is one of 12 principals from across the United States to receive the 2009 NCEA Dr. Robert J. Kealey Distinguished Principal Award from the Department of Elementary Schools of the National Catholic Education



Association. The recipients of this award, which honors distinguished educational leaders, come from the 12 geographic regions that compose the NCEA Department of Elementary Schools. Miss O'Hara was chosen from a possible pool of more than 6,000 principals.

Teachers and students can use the board like a computer but they can also write on the boards, as well as interact with the material. Teachers can also save the lesson on their computer and post it on their website for students to review later which is especially helpful for a student that needs repeti-

tion or for a student who was absent. Smartboards are amazing tools for our school!



The pope will also proclaim St. John Vianney to be patron saint of all the world's priests during this year. At present he is considered the patron saint of parish priests. This year marks the 150th anniversary of the death of this 19th-century saint who represents a "true example of a priest at the service of the flock of Christ," the pope said.

St. John Vianney is widely known to Catholics as the Cure (parish priest) of Ars, a rural and spiritually dying town in central France. He won over the hearts of his villagers by visiting with them, teaching them about God and reconciling people to the Lord in the confessional for hours on end.

The U.S. bishops' Secretariat for Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations has set up

- 4. Remember him with a prayer bouquet.
- 5. Send him a card at Christmas and on his birthday.
- 6. Have your children color him a picture or write him a letter.
- 7. Ask him individually what someone could do to honor his vocation.

MEET FR. CHUE VANG

St. Vincent de Paul's New Parochial Vicar

i! My name is Fr. Chue Ying Vang. The "a" in my last name is pronounced "ah" like "art."

I was born and raised in Laos during the Vietnam War. I have five sisters and four brothers. I am the sixth child and the youngest son in the family. Six

of us are here in the States. One brother Seminary, St. Mary's College in Winona, war.

The Hmong lived in the mountains. In the war they were recruited by the CIA (Central Intelligence Agency) to fight against the North Vietnamese Communists. When the communists took over my country in 1975, I escaped to Thailand with two of my brothers and two cousins. In Thailand we lived in refugee camps and were supported by the United Nations. It was in the refugee Some of the things that I find fulfilling in camp that I was converted to Catholicism.

In 1980 I came to the United States on an immigrant visa with one of my brothers, his wife, their daughter and a cousin. We ar-



rived in Rochester, Minnesota in the middle of February and it was so cold. The first thing we learned was to put on a winter coat. We were sponsored by the Church of St. Pius.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

A True Servant of God

t. Vincent de Paul is the patron saint of Charitable Societies. He was born in the village of Pouy in Gascony, France on April 24, 1581. He studied theology at the University of Toulouse and was ordained a priest in 1600 at the age of 19. In 1605, on a voyage by sea from Marseilles to Narbonne. Vincent fell into the hands of African pirates and was taken as a slave to Tunis. His captivity lasted until his escape about two years later.

After a brief visit to Rome, he returned to France where he became preceptor in the family of the Count of Goigny, the General of the galleys of France. Through this lofty association. Vincent came to preach missions to peasants as well as convicts in the galleys. In 1625, he established the foundations of a congregation which later became the Congregation of the Mission or Lazarists, so named on account of the

Priory of St. Lazarus which the Fathers began to occupy in 1633. He also started the first religious group of women dedicated entirely to works of charity outside the cloister, a group called the Daughters

of Charity.

Vincent's predominant virtue was charity, extending to all classes of persons. Despite his association with the nobility of his day, Vincent remained deeply rooted in humility. In the midst of the most distracting occupations, his soul was always closely united with God. A true servant of God, St. Vincent de Paul died in Paris on September 27, 1660 at the age of 80, and was canonized a saint in the Roman Catholic Church in 1737. The feast day of St. Vincent de Paul is celebrated on September 27th.

SYMBOLS OF FAITH

Christian Fish Symbol

t a recent newsletter committee meeting, a member shared how she was explaining to her children how different car companies and car models have logos that identify them. One child asked which company makes the "fish car".

Have you ever been behind a car at a stoplight and noticed a metallic fish on the trunk or bumper? Maybe it

even had the name of Jesus inside the fish. Did you know that the fish is an ancient symbol of Jesus?

Our Catholic faith is rich in symbols. Symbols express more than mere words can express. It certainly makes sense to me that when it comes to something as mysterious and as important as our faith that we rely on symbols when words fail to express the deep meaning of our relationship with God. Our everyday lives are full of times when we use a symbol or a symbolic gesture to express what words just cannot



adequately convey. We kiss or hug someone to express our love. Think of what a crayon drawn heart on a piece of paper means given by a child to a parent. We give gifts to express our appreciation or congratulations because just saying thank you or congratulations isn't enough.

The fish was used in early Christian times as a secret

symbol for Jesus. A Christian would draw half of the fish and if the other person drew the other half, they knew they had found a fellow believer.

But the symbol goes even deeper in meaning. In Greek, the initial letters of the words, Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior, spell ICHTHYS which is the Greek word for fish.

So the next time you see a "fish car", know that the driver is a fellow believer in Jesus.
