
There are also opportunities to deepen and share our faith in this issue, as well as ideas and resources to help you parent and connect with your teen.

CHANGES IN THE LANGUAGE OF THE MASS

A Deeper Meaning, but the Same Mass



The Roman Missal we currently use is the English translation of the Latin Missale Romanum. Prior to the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), the Roman Missal contained the readings and prayers of the Mass in one volume. The Roman Missal, as every liturgical book used in the Roman Catholic Church, is first published entirely in Latin, for centuries the preferred language of the church. The Second Vatican Council maintained this preference for the Latin language, but also allowed for the use of "the mother tongue within the Mass" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy-54). The use of the vernacular, the common language of the people (English), has helped us pray with greater understanding and deeper spiritual connections.

The prayers still needed to translated from the original Latin to The English. first edition of



the English language Sacramentary was published in 1974. Thirty years later, Pope John Paul II issued the new Missal that we will use in our parishes this Fall. First available in Latin in 2002, there are FEW changes in the Latin texts of the new Missal. However, because of new principles of translation, the changes for English speaking parishes will be noticeable. St. Vincent's Worship Commission has been working on the plan for introducing these new texts for months. This Fall, with multiple visual and audio resources to aid us. we will experience these changes in short weekly introductions of "discovery celebration." Along with learning new musical settings, this discovery should be enjoyable.

Translation is an art. Multiple definitions exist for any one word within a language. The publication and release of the third edition of the Roman Missal reflects a new understanding of translation principles. For many of us it will be a challenge to hear changes to phrases or familiar cadences we've repeated for decades. There are far more changes in the Presider's prayers than those of the Assembly. For all of us, the challenge will be to discover the beauty and richness of the texts of the Holy Mass anew.





Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, one in Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he was born of the Virgin Mary, and became man. FAITH IN GOD

An Important Part of Our Everyday Lives

aith in God is a fundamental aspect of our relationship with Him. God is *always* faithful, so we too must be *always* faithful. Learning the importance of having faith and living our lives faithfully is our task. We can learn the importance of having faith by reading and studying the Gospels, the Catechism of the Catholic Church and Pope Benedict XVI's papal encyclical *Saved in Hope*.

Jesus reminds us several times throughout the Gospels of how important it is to have faith in God. In Matthew 6:31-32, Jesus says, "Stop worrying over questions like, what are we to eat, or what are we to drink, or what are we to wear? The unbelievers are always running after these things. Your heavenly Father knows all that you need." Mark 2:5 tells us, "When Jesus saw their faith he said to the paralyzed man, 'My son, your sins are forgiven." In Luke 17:6, Jesus tells us, "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this sycamore, 'Be uprooted and transplanted into the sea,' and it would obey you." In John 6:47 Jesus says, "Let me firmly assure you, he who believes has eternal life."

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us the importance of faith. "By his Revelation, 'the invisible God, from the fullness of his love, addresses men as his friends, and moves among them, in order to invite and receive them into his own company." The adequate response to this invitation is faith." (CCC 142) The Catechism also has many more teachings regarding faith for us to reference.

Pope Benedict XVI teaches us the importance of faith in many ways. One example of this is his papal encyclical, Saved in Hope. In this encyclical, Pope Benedict calls faith 'hope.' He writes, "...we need the greater and lesser hopes that keep us going day by day. But these are not enough without the great hope, which must surpass everything else. This great hope can only be God, who encompasses the whole of reality and who can bestow upon us what we, ourselves cannot attain. The fact that it comes to us as a gift is actually part of hope. God is the foundation of hope: not any god, but the God who has a human face and who has loved us to the end, each one of us and humanity in its entirety.

H i s Kingdom is not an



imaginary hereafter, situated in a future that will never arrive; his Kingdom is present wherever he is loved and wherever his love reaches us. His love alone gives us the possibility of soberly persevering day by day, without ceasing to be spurred on by hope, in a world which by its very nature is imperfect. His love is at the same time our guarantee of the existence of what we only vaguely sense and which nevertheless, in our deepest self, we await: a life that is 'truly' life."

Living faithful lives has many benefits. According to the Catechism (CCC 222-227) it has the following implications:

- 1. It means coming to know God's greatness and majesty.
- It means living in thanksgiving.
- 3. It means knowing the unity and true dignity of all men.
- 4. It means making good use of created things.
- 5. It means trusting God in every circumstance.

In practical terms, it means living close to God. This can be easier said than done. In times of suffering our faith can be shaken. In times of prosperity our faith can grow weak from lack of attention. In the business of modern everyday life faith can be forgotten. Having faith takes time and effort. Having a strong faith in God requires our daily attention. Try using the Implications of Faith as a tool to assess your faith in everyday situations.

Faith can be strengthened in many ways. Attending Mass regularly, praying daily, studying the Bible, taking a class on a religious topic, attending a workshop at church or talking to someone are all wonderful ways to strengthen your faith. Our parish has several opportunities to help promote your faith. The children were always lively, enthusiastic and eager to participate in whatever we had planned for that eve-




ning and watching them learn and grow in God's world was so worth it.

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SYMBOLS OF FAITH

The Gospel Book at St. Vincent de Paul

The golden book that is carried into Mass at St. Vincent's draws the attention of all those who view it. The Gospel Book is displayed prominently for all to enjoy its finery at the front of the Altar. The book does stand out from others and may leave many wondering why it is so visually stunning.

The answer to why the book is unique truly lies in its contents. The beautiful book is a compilation of four narratives that depict the life of Jesus. The Gospels according to Mathew, Mark, Luke and John are the records of Christ's word and actions. The Gospel Book is ornately decorated to stand out

as it signifies the importance of Christ's actions.

The gold binding is not the only unique feature of the cover. Four depictions are etched in the cover and are symbolic of the four contributors. The four contributors to the Gospel Book are considered to be four pillars, elemental to the development of the Church. Numbers have an important role in the Church. The number four is considered to be representative of the four corners of the Earth or the four elements. The four Gospels explain the life of Jesus for all to understand and are represented by the images on the cover. Mathew is represented by a winged man, Mark by a lion, Luke by a calf, and John by an eagle. The four teachers were provided, by the power of the Holy Page 8



Spirit, wisdom, strength, courage, and an ability to rise above others to comprehend the life and teachings of Jesus.

These etchings not only symbolize the four contributors but they also represent the content of the works: Jesus Christ. The book of Genesis teaches us that man was made in the image of God and is a rational creature. Jesus was sent to be salvation for all of mankind. Lions are symbolic of strength. The trials and events which Jesus endured took great strength, faith and courage. Through His actions, He provided strength and faith for us all. Eagles also have great

strength and endurance. They have the ability to soar to great heights and are a depiction of the heights to which Jesus rose. The calf was often used in sacrifices and is symbolic of the sacrifice that Jesus made with his Resurrection.

Although the binding of the Gospel Book draws attention, it is the contents of the book itself that are significant. The bindings and etchings are merely symbolic of the contents. The word gospel means "good news." It seems only fitting that the good news Jesus brought, shared to us by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, should be displayed prominently.
