They can be looked at during the school year by asking Jan Endris in the office. For new uniforms I have found French Toast is a terrific brand that holds up very well. I purchase them through www.Marcus Uniforms.com (it seems odd because this is a

catalog for nursing scrubs) they are cheaper than purchasing direct from French Toast. Another reason I like French Toast pants is because they come with a clasp instead of buttons which comes in handy when little ones are in a hurry to use the bathroom. Jill Sampica

The uniform exchange is great because everything on the table is free. Families turn in what they no longer need and another family just picks it up for their children. I have never purchased a sweatshirt. For new parents don't worry about the exchange part. You can take what you need and donate when you can. For new uniforms I buy one pair of shorts usually from Target in Plymouth (they are on the sales floor early in July). I Purchase 3 pair of reinforced knee pants from Sears. We usually buy 2 skorts big enough to be worn in the fall and the spring. We then buy 3 pair of pants and 3 short sleeve polo shirts. If she gets cold she uses a cardigan that we purchase from Lands End. We also make sure to buy tennis shoes that look good with the uniforms because that is what my son and daughter wear everyday.



When winter hits, I send a pair of snow-pants and boots to school that can be kept in their lockers. This keeps us from having to wear them to school every morning (I drive them to school so many days the snow gear is not necessary). It also keeps us from having to stuff them into a full backpack. If there is a snowstorm during school hours the kids wear their stuff home.

At first I had concerns about having my young kids on the bus with the high school kids. Despite my fears I put them on the bus because I was too lazy to pack the young ones up in the morning and drive the older ones to school. Over the years I have noticed 3 things. 1. I think riding the bus teaches kids to be independent by knowing when it is coming and being ready. 2. The younger kids are required to sit in the front of the bus so my kids always felt safe. 3. It gives the kids a little more social time with their friends especially after school.



My kids ride the bus and we have found it to be a pretty smooth process. Some of the kids who baby sit for us in the neighborhood ride the bus and really look out for my kids. When my daughter was in first grade we had a few problems that were occurring during the transfer process at the high school. The problem was handled quickly and efficiently and never happened again! The bus for us has worked out great, and I was a "nervous nelly" about that. You can talk to the bus driver the first day, just to check in and meet him/her and make your request for sitting up front. We used to give "Diet Coke" to our bus driver because he loved it! This is VERY IMPORTANT FOR NEWCOMERS TO THE BUS: Remind your kids not to accept ANY candy or snacks or anything from anyone on the bus. We used the moment as a teaching opportunity to educate our kids about taking items from strangers.



Papers & Supplies

Each child has a magnetic clip on the firdge to place important papers, upcoming projects and peek at the week. I also look at the papers right away and recycle the ones I don't need. Michelle Gooley



We fill out everything right away so it doesn't get buried. I keep the school calendar on our fridge. I rip out the month and keep 1 sheet up at a time. I have my son check to see what day he is on. I personally found it helpful to have a magazine holder (a crock actually) just for my son's things. They get site words, little books and practice sheets that tend to get lost in the shuffle if they do not have a home. When it comes to reading bedtime stories, he can read to me first out of his things. St. Vincent's teachers really do a wonderful job with communication. A "Peek at the Week" gives you a heads up on what is coming that week. You know the topics that were covered and use your "Peek" to start a learning, sharing conversation.

Allergies & Health

My son has life-threatening food allergies, (peanut, tree nut, soy). He always sits at the peanut/nut-free table. He enjoys that this special table is always full of his friends, who are eating a

"safe" lunch that day. The lunch-aides use a special cleaning bottle and papers towels to wipe down the table/chairs. The kitchen staff does a great job regarding this. I also volunteer my time helping the lunchroom staff during lunch time. As a parent of this scary situation, I always have a meeting with my child's teacher at the beginning of the school year. This helps the teacher understand our concerns and I can answer any questions they may have. This meeting also makes me feel better regarding the situation. Let them know you are available to help in anyway. Also try to be available to help with classroom parties, treats, field trips etc. The nurse has info regarding food allergies provided by The Food Allergy Network. (Including a VHS tape about an Elephant who has a peanut allergy to show the class.) I have noticed it has become easier in the older grades for my son. For example, less messy eating to be smeared on hands, pencils, etc. Your child's classmates take on a caring/protecting role. They are a huge advocate on helping your child stay safe!! When one of my children was in 1st grade, we were having behavior problems after school. Our normally easy going child would go into complete melt down mode. She would cry and act irrational over the smallest things. We were also having some issues in the morning. After lots of trial and error we traced some of the behavior to her diet.
